Dear parent/carer

Adam is moving on to a role within the Senedd, where he will be putting his superb IT skills to use.

Ruth D'Adamo has been part of our support staff team for 29 years. In that time she has performed a range of roles within the school such as cleaner, dinner supervisor and food technology technician. Amongst many other things, pupils will be wondering who will now blow the whistle on the fields to signify the end of lunch break?

Kerry Roberts is leaving us after 18 years also to enjoy a well-earned retirement. Kerry has also undertaken a number of roles at the school including cleaner and more recently supporting in our Sixth Form Centre where our pupils will tell you her providing our pupils with her legendary toast, tea and words of wisdom and support. You also may have met Kerry in the bus bay at the end of the day where, in all weathers, she ensures that every single pupil is safely on the bus (and often paying herself when pupils have not had enough money for the bus fare).



Matt Copp has been part of Brynteg for 23 years. He joined us as a student teacher and found it so hard to leave he became a member of staff in September 2001. He has been a key part of the science team in school and has taught pupils in all year groups. His passion for pastoral care led him to becoming an assistant year leader before taking on the position of Year Leader in 2015. Currently he is Head of Year 10 and I know his year group will all miss him (perhaps not the extra-long assemblies). Mr Copp is leaving us to continue his teaching in his beloved home town of Swansea.

I am sure you will join with me in wishing all of the colleagues who are leaving us today well, thanking them for their amazing service to the Brynteg community and good luck for their lives beyond our school.

Dear parent/carer

As you are aware, there has been a lot of social media attention regarding some of our work this week on social media, and I won't repeat what I said in my previous letter apart from encouraging you to talk to us should you be concerned about any aspect of our provision at all. Something happens between primary and secondary school, which means we become more distant from parents and carers. Dear parent/carer and pupils

'The greatest sign of success for a teacher is to be able to say, 'The children are now working as if I did not exist.' –Maria Montessori

Thank you for your support during our Professional Learning Day on Tuesday. The day focused on literacy, numeracy and digital competence skills and how all staff (regardless of their subject discipline) have an important role in helping our pupils to develop these.

We are so proud of the work we have done in developing our new curriculum model, which, at the moment, is embedded into years 7 and 8 and will move into year 9 in September. One of the strengths of the new approach is the fact staff have been able to identify the content which they feel is important to them at Brynteg School. Being in control of the curriculum in this way has also meant that we have been able to ensure that the development of skills is a key part of this model and not simply an 'add on'.

What we are increasingly finding with our pupils in year 7 and year 8 is that, not only are they developing the skills and acquiring the essential knowledge as highlighted in our model but they are also increasingly becoming independent, resilient learners which is something I know employers and universities have been asking for many years. They highlight the following skills which they say are essential to anyone moving into the world of work in the near future:

Communication Problem-solving skills	being able to understand others and communicate effectively being able to identify a problem and working to find a solution to it
Adaptability to change	the ability to quickly and successfully embrace change and adapt effectively in response to it
Initiative	the ability to be resourceful and work without always being told what to do. It requires resilience and determination

Schools have proven over the years that they can prepare pupils for exams and many of these have gone on to be incredibly successful. However, feedback has been that there has always been something missing as these pupils go on to access employment/education opportunities.

What we are seeing with our new curriculum model is that our pupils are developing their communication, problem solving, adaptability and initiative skills. What is so exciting is tha these pupils are continually demonstrating that they are determined, resilient learners and I honestly believe that this is giving them the best possible preparation for life beyond school.

Seeing our year 7 and 8 pupils at work, it can, at times, feel as if we, as staff, do not 'exist' (as mentioned in the Maria Montessori quote above) and perhaps this is the best possible feedback we can have about our new learning and teaching model!

Dydd Gwyl Dewi Hapus!

"It's the teacher that makes the difference, not the classroom." –Michael Morpurgo

This quote is so true. The only change I would make to it is to say it is **all staff** in school, not just teachers, who have the ability to inspire and enthuse pupils. In a school such as Brynteg, there are so many examples of teachers and support staff creating wonderful learning opportunities for pupils in buildings that, quite frankly, are not fit for 21st Century learning. Driving past our school and looking at the grand buildings surrounded by beautiful fields and trees would give the impression that the learning spaces and other facilities are equally as outstanding. Nothing could be further from the truth, and whilst staff (especially our brilliant premises team) have all worked hard over the years to make the best out of our situation, this is proving to be increasingly difficult.

If you then consider that this week, we were told (as were all schools in Bridgend) that we would receive a 3% cut in our 2024-25 budget, which, for us, represents a reduction in our available finance of around £250,000. A reduction of this magnitude is bound to make an impact on us as a school and I know that governors are preparing for some extremely difficult decisions in the coming months. What is apparent is that to ensure that pupils have access to the staff that they need to make a difference in the classroom then, other plans will have to be put on hold – for example, the work that we had intended to do in terms of developing our classrooms and site, the funding of extra-curricular activities and so on. These things will have to be decided by the governing body in the coming months, but clearly, there will be an impact in the coming year.

Our staff are amazing and I know there will be an absolute commitment from them to ensuring that there is no impact on the quality of learning and teaching (as they have always done) but I am fully aware of the hidden costs of these cuts too. For example, if there are larger class sizes, while staff will ensure that this will not impact pupils, there is an immediate increase in the amount of planning, preparation, and assessment that they will have to undertake. I don't know if you are aware, but many staff have traditionally taken their own decision to buy resources for their pupils themselves – whilst this is not something which they are directed to do in any way, I would assume that their thoughts will turn to making decisions such as these more and more in the future.

To use another quote, 'A great teacher can teach with a paper clip and literature in an empty field' (Unknown) – and this is something I have seen repeatedly where those brilliant staff inspire and enthuse pupils often simply by walking into the classroom! However, there comes a time where you can take away so much that it really does make this amazing job of ours so incredibly difficult and it is only the commitment and dedication of our staff which ensures that the incredibly important task of developing the outstanding citizens of the future continues unhindered.

All I hope is that there is recognition of the impact of the cuts and the work that Brynteg and all schools are doing to avoid these impacting negatively on pupils. Being in the privileged position of having daily contact with our pupils, I know how bright the future is for them – with the appropriate level of resourcing, this future could be brighter still.

I believe that teaching is the best and most important job in the world. There is nothing quite like it, with no two days or no two lessons ever being the same. Yes, there are times when there are challenges and things do not go according to plan (the extremely wet Wednesday we just had is a case in point), but I am sure this is true in all jobs! Being a teacher for over 35 years has undoubtedly had those times that have been testing, but the highs far outweigh any difficult days.

Having access to inspirational teachers and support staff myself made such impact on and convinced me from a very early age that teaching was the career for me. I was so lucky to be surrounded by many incredible teachers and support staff who convinced me to have confidence in my abilities and opened my eyes to many opportunities and experiences.

I wonder how many of you remember those teachers or support staff who really made a positive difference to your time in school? I still remember Mr and Mrs James, who were the most amazing music teachers at my secondary school. I am not a talented musician by any means, but I attribute my lifelong love of music to their talent, enthusiasm and energy. When Mr. and Mrs. James taught you, their love of their subject and passion for teaching shone through, and I enjoyed every moment in their classes.

Not only did they develop my love for music, but they also became mentors to me, guiding me through my time in secondary school, where they often had to highlight to me how I could be making the wrong choices. It was only after beginning my teaching career that I came to appreciate that, as well as being incredibly passionate teachers of music, the fact that they did genuinely care about every single pupil made them stand out as outstanding teachers.

It was Mr James who convinced me to audition for the Mid Glamorgan Youth Orchestra, which resulted in me attending numerous music courses (at the now-defunct Ogmore Residential Centre) and performing in venues across the county. This experience and the friendships I made during this time have stayed with me; had it not been for my music teachers, this would never have happened. I owe them so much.

As a teacher, I have tried to model myself on the staff, such as Mr. and Mrs. James, who were so crucial to my time in school. In the early days of my career, I quickly realised how difficult it is to balance the demands of being a highly effective teacher with recognising and supporting pupils' individual needs – and how easy excellent teachers such as Mr. and Mrs. James made it look! Now, as a Headteacher, one of the most important parts of my role is to ensure that every single pupil feels that we care about them, we treat them as individuals and that they have access to learning opportunities which inspires and enthuses them – and seeing this in action at Brynteg is always the highlight of the week for me.

Sadly, Mr. and Mrs. James are no longer with us, but I would like to think that they would recognise their influence on both me as a teacher and in the work being done in Brynteg School. For me, the following Japanese Proverb sums up the impact that staff in school had on me in my time in school, and indeed, I know this is the case in Brynteg now:

'Better than a thousand days of diligent study is one day with a great teacher.'

Dear parent/carer

I hope you and your family are well.

As mentioned in a previous letter, from Monday 19th February we are moving to a new system of dealing with **ALL** pupil queries through our 'Pupil Support Hub'. This will ensure that all queries are dealt with promptly according to the level of need by a team of specialists who are trained in identifying pupil support needs. It is felt that this new development will provide parents and carers with the level of response which has been asked for in recent years whilst, at the same time acknowledging the fact that often members of the pupil support team are unavailable as a result of teaching and other commitments. The changes from February 19th are as follows:

On contacting the school with a pupil query this will be dealt with by a member of the Pupil Support Hub Team. You can contact the Pupil Support Hub in the following ways:

1. Pupil Support Hub Referral Form (preferred method)

By completing on Pupil Support Hub form. This is the preferred method of contact as it will provide us with the information required to give you the most appropriate and efficient level of response. Requests sent using this method will be dealt with immediately. The form will be open for use from 8am on Monday 19th February and can be accessed using the link below:

Please note that until 8am on Monday 19th February, the message 'this form will no longer accept responses' will appear and you will not be able to submit responses.

2. Emailing the Pupil Support Hub

From Monday 19th February, there will be ONE email account which will be used for all pupil support queries. Whilst you may have sent an email to individual staff in the past, we ask that from this point on you use the following email address as this is the only guarantee that the query will be dealt with promptly:

This email address is monitored throughout the day during school hours by the pupil support team and they will action such requests accordingly.

If you do email, please include all of the information we require in order to deal with your query promptly and efficiently. Again, you may well find it easier to use the Pupil Support Referral Form as in this way you will know that the information we require will have been provided.



3. Telephoning the Pupil Support Hub

You are still able to contact us by telephone and from Monday 19th February you will be given the option to be transferred to the Pupil Support Hub from the main menu. We ask that, where possible, the telephone line is only used from urgent queries (although it must be stressed that submitting the referral form will be just as quick in terms of response time). To contact the Pupil Support Hub, please use the following number:

01656 815559 - choose the 'Pupil Support Hub' option

You will still also have the dedicated option to report an absence in addition to the Pupil Support Hub option.

Whatever the pupil-related query, we ask that you use the Pupil Support Hub and someone will be on-hand to deal with it. This could be something as straightforward as checking what type of PE kit needs to be brought for lessons on a day, to updating us regarding medical information to issues which are more urgent and require an immediate response.

As mentioned earlier, the feedback that we have received from parents and carers is that you would like a more efficient response to pupil support queries and we feel that the new hub will help us to achieve this. From your part, we ask that you use the pupil support hub as the main method of contacting staff in school – you may well have used individual email addresses and so on in the past but the problem with this has always been queries can only be dealt with when the member of staff is available whereas, with our new arrangement, there will always be a team on hand to deal with you query. Please help us to make this a success by using the Pupil Support Hub for all your pupil-related queries.

Good luck to the pupils in years 11,12 and 13 who will be sitting mock examinations next week. This is a good opportunity for them to get used to working under examination conditions in preparation for the summer. They are 'mock' exams for a reason in that they enable pupils and staff what needs to be done to be ready for the final exams and should be approached in that way.

Finally, we are looking forward to meeting our Year 10 parents and carers next week (8th Feb) as we continue with the return to in-person parent/carer meetings. There have been some alterations to the locations of the meetings with subject teachers following feedback received from the Year 9 meeting a couple of weeks ago and it is hoped that this improves the experience for parents, carers and pupils still further.

Dear parent/carer

I am writing again to ask for your support if you drive your son/daughter to school. The area outside the school on Ewenny Road and Heol Gam is becoming extremely congested and is now quite dangerous. Not only are cars being parked far too close to the school gates, they are being parked on the yellow zig-zag lines outside school and often across the driveways of our neighbours. Highway Code rule 243 states:

DO NOT stop or park:

- near a school entrance
- anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services
- opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space
- opposite a traffic island or (if this would cause an obstruction) another parked vehicle
- where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles
- in front of an entrance to a property
- on a bend

Sadly, we experience examples of <u>all</u> of the above regularly and I fear it is only a matter of time before one of our pupils is injured as a result of this behaviour. Please help us to make the beginning and end of the day safer for all of our pupils, staff and members of the community.

Mock exams take place for years 11, 12 and 13 on the week beginning 5th February and all pupils should now have received their timetable with details of when these are going to take place. This is an extremely important exercise for our pupils in terms of them gaining a 'real' experience of examinations as they begin their preparations for May/June. As well as sitting the exams, part of the process should be experimenting with a revision plan and finding out what works/doesn't work before it is too late and is something that all pupils in years 11,12 and 13 should aim to do in the coming days. Our year 8 pupils recently took part in an excellent Humanities Expedition Day at Swansea University. The day allowed our pupils to find out about the impact of World War Two on Swansea and Bridgend as well as allowing them to demonstrate

Dear parent/carer

I hope that you are your family had a good Christmas break and can I wish you all a safe and prosperous new year.

The new term is quite short with there only being 5 weeks both before and after the half term break (we break up on Friday 9th February for half term and Friday 22nd March for Easter) as the Easter period falls very early in the calendar this year. At the moment, there is a consultation being undertaken by the Welsh Government which is looking at reshaping the school year from as early as September 2025. Included in the proposals are:

- Making the October half term break 2 weeks long (starting in October 2025)
- Adopting a system whereby the end of the spring term 2-week break would always fall at the start of April with the Good Friday and Easter Monday bank holidays being given should they fall outside the new holiday arrangement (starting in April 2026)
- Reducing the summer break to 5 weeks (starting in July 2026).

There will be no reduction in teaching time and the number of holidays will remain the same with the proposal simply redistributing time across the academic year.

Already our year 11 pupils have been extremely busy as far as examinations are concerned. On Wednesday, many of them sat their GCSE English paper and their response was extremely positive. On Thursday, those pupils who sat their Maths/numeracy GCSE examination in November received their results which were excellent and really does provide them with a solid platform on which to build as they move towards their final examinations in May. For those that just missed out on the 'C' grade, they quite clearly are so close to achieving the grade and with the support from our fantastic maths team, I am sure they will do well in May.



In response to feedback received from pupils, parents and carers regarding the communication between school and home regarding pupil issues, a new system has been designed and will come into operation from **Monday 19th February**. The Pupil Support Hub will be a central point for all pupil queries which will then be able to be dealt with promptly and efficiently by the pupil support team. When you feel you need to contact the school, you will be able to contact one central point using one of the following methods:

- An online referral form
- Sending an email to the Pupil Support Hub central email address
- Telephoning the Pupil Support Hub

The hub will be staffed at all times throughout the day and this will ensure that queries that are received will be dealt with promptly. Whilst we will be working as a team on this, the year teams will still play a vitally important part in providing pupil support and will be the team you will link in with after the original referral should this be required. More information will be sent out in the coming weeks including the link to the referral form, details of the pupil support hub email address and so on.

It has been an excellent start to the new term with lots of exciting learning and teaching taking place right across the school. Here you can see some of our year 8 pupils testing out their wind turbine designs which they completed as part of their Science and Technology expedition challenge. This demonstrated quite clearly how much value there is to be had in terms of learning when pupils are able to problem solve in a real way.



A reminder that you should have received a copy of the ballot paper for the election of our **parent/carer governors**. The ballot papers need to be returned to school by no later than **10am on 23rd January**.


Skirts/Trousers


Upper School Tie

Continue with the arrangement as it is (tie changes in year 10/11) after considering the responses from pupils and staff as well







Our Expedition Days set challenges for pupils (such as the one you see in the photograph below) and the showcase event allowed parents and carers to observe the wide range of learning evidence which pupils have through these.



In the photograph above you can see one of our brilliant year pupils trying out the robotic arm which they had to design using levers, the challenge being that the arm had to be able to be used in an operating theatre. The arm had to be effective enough to move a heart into the dummy and after a great deal of trial and error, pupils demonstrated that they were able to complete this operation successfully – a fantastic demonstration of the curriculum bringing learning to life!

We are extremely proud of our new curriculum model but are always looking to make improvements as this develops over the years. One area which we are focussing on is parent/carer involvement in the learning process; whilst the Curriculum Showcase events offer an excellent means of sharing learning we would like to develop a model where parents and carers have the opportunity to contribute to the learning process as it develops.
